Public Health Research Programme Rapid Funding Scheme

The Public Health Research (PHR) Programme funds research to generate evidence to inform the delivery of non-NHS interventions, intended to improve the health of the public, and reduce inequalities in health.

The Rapid Funding Scheme (RFS) offers researchers the opportunity to apply for funds to conduct rapid baseline data collection, as well as other feasibility work, prior to intervention implementation, for unique, time-limited opportunities such as a natural experiment or similar evaluations of a new public health intervention.

This scheme is not intended to fund studies which provide definitive answers to questions to inform service provision – it is to prepare for such studies.

The RFS has been set up to provide the public health research community with an accelerated route to funding for small-scale, short and time sensitive proposals that demonstrate a need for a rapid commissioning process to be followed. Funding will be offered, subject to appropriate scientific scrutiny, on the understanding that a full application to support completion of the evaluation will be forthcoming at an appropriate time point.

Proposals submitted to the RFS will

- make a convincing case of the urgency to undertake the research and justify why the data collection needs to start within a timescale which can't be accommodated by the programme's normal research commissioning processes, taking advantage of an unanticipated, time limited, natural experiment opportunity.
- be clear why the work could not have been proposed earlier.
- meet the remit of the PHR programme, with a view to generate evidence to inform the delivery of non-NHS interventions.

- lead to the submission of a proposal for a full evaluation, which would generate research findings that are generalisable and have clear utility for public health decision makers with the potential to change practice.
- be deliverable for a total cost £50,000 or less.
- be for a duration of six months or less.
- be for base line data collection or urgent feasibility work.
- have a study team established and ready to start work if the application is successful.

If you would like your proposal to be considered for the RFS, please contact phr@nihr.ac.uk with a summary of your intended project of no more than two sides of A4 in length describing both the proposed work, how it fits within the remit of the PHR Programme, the reasons for the projects urgency and the trajectory to a full evaluation.

Once the information provided has been considered by the PHR Programme, you will be informed whether your proposal is eligible for the RFS. If eligible you will be given four weeks to complete a stage 2 application form. A final decision will be communicated to the applicant within 4-6 weeks of the application.

Common reasons for non-eligibility of proposals in this scheme

- The application does not demonstrate urgency, eg It does not show why usual PHR processes could not be used.
- The urgency of the application arises through inaction, eg It has been known for several years that an event will happen, but an evaluation has only been considered at the last minute.
- The claimed urgent opportunity occurs on a regular and frequent basis, eg the start of a school year.
- The scale of the project proposed is too large for the resources available in this funding stream.

Solutions

- Clearly demonstrate the urgency and uniqueness of the opportunity
- Or use standard PHR processes to apply for funding
- Be proactive in identifying research opportunities, and apply through standard processes

NIHR Advanced Fellowship Round 9

The National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) is launching the 9th round of Advanced Fellowships as part of the NIHR Fellowship Programme.

These awards are for individuals and their host organisations looking to submit an application to the Advanced Fellowship. If you are unsure whether you are eligible to apply for this award – please see below details.

The NIHR Advanced Fellowship is a post-doctoral Fellowship and aimed at anyone with a PhD who hasn't yet been awarded a Chair. Applicants who are active clinicians (defined as being either a registered doctor, dentist or registered healthcare professionals eligible to apply for the Integrated Clinical Academic programme) or social workers, are able to request up to 40% of their time be dedicated to clinical service/development/practice, which will be covered by the Fellowship. Fellowships are between 2 and 5 years Whole Time Equivalent (WTE) in duration and may be taken up on a part-time basis between 50% and 100% WTE.

The NIHR is partnering with Moorfields Eye Charity, MS Society, Rosetrees Trust, The Colt Foundation and Pfizer to offer joint Advanced Fellowships as part of Round 9.

To be eligible for an NIHR Advanced Fellowship:

- Proposed host must be an English (or a participating devolved nation HEI), NHS body, social care organisation or other provider of health and/or care services.
- Applicants must hold a relevant PhD or MD, or have submitted their thesis for examination at the time of application. Applicants must have been awarded their PhD or MD by the time they attend interview.
- Individuals must not already hold a Chair at the point of application.
- For clinical applicants only: completion of relevant pre-registration training.

The closing date for the NIHR Advanced Fellowship scheme is at 1pm on 12 January 2023

NIHR Doctoral Fellowship Round 9

The National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) is launching the 9th round of Doctoral Fellowships as part of the NIHR Fellowship Programme.

These awards are for individuals and their host organisations looking to submit an application to the Doctoral Fellowship. If you are unsure whether you are eligible to apply for this award – please see below details.

The NIHR is partnering with Diabetes UK, Moorfields Eye Charity and Wellbeing of Women to offer joint Doctoral Fellowships as part of Round 9.

The NIHR Doctoral Fellowship is a three year full-time award that supports individuals to undertake a PhD in an area of NIHR research. This fellowship may also be taken up on a part-time basis. Clinical applicants are able to include up to 20% clinical time as part of the fellowship, to ensure the maintenance of their clinical competence whilst undertaking the fellowship.

To be eligible for an NIHR Doctoral Fellowship you must:

- Have completed any relevant pre-registration training (for clinical applicants).
- Have completed a first degree (for non-clinical applicants).
- Have a proposed host who is an HEI, NHS body, social care organisation, or other provider of health and/or care services.
- Be intending to register for and complete a PhD.
- Where already registered for a PhD (or MPhil with transfer to PhD), you should not have been registered for more than 12 months at 100% WTE by the time the award starts.

The closing date for the NIHR Doctoral Fellowship scheme is at 1pm on 2 February 2023.

Clinical research fellowships – Versus Arthritis

Versus Arthritis invites applications for its clinical research fellowships. These encourage clinically qualified professionals into an academic research career in any discipline relevant to arthritis and related musculoskeletal conditions. The aim is to provide training in clinical and laboratory research techniques leading to a higher degree, usually a PhD.

Medical and non-medical healthcare professionals may apply. Medical graduates must apply during their speciality training and non-medical healthcare professionals must have at least one year's experience of clinical practice. Non-medical healthcare professions that are eligible to apply include: dentists, physiotherapists, nurses, occupational therapists, podiatrists, prosthetists and orthotists, psychologists, veterinary surgeons, radiographers and pharmacists. Applicants must be associated with an established sponsor, within a multidisciplinary research group in a UK university department, hospital or research institute. The application must be made jointly by the candidate and their sponsor. Applications for master's degrees are not accepted.

The fellowship is normally awarded for three years, although applications for less than three years' funding are also encouraged. The award covers salaries, reasonable research expenses such as small pieces of equipment up to £30,000 in value, consumables, purchase and maintenance of laboratory animals and travels to collaborating institutions. Consultant level salaries or NHS salaries above band 7 are not funded, and PhD tuition fees are not provided.

Fund for healthcare professionals ^{NEW}

The Novo Nordisk UK Research Foundation invites applications for its fund for healthcare professionals. This supports clinical projects, training and education within the field of diabetes in the UK. Funding may be used as:

- support of a clinical project;
- attendance at a relevant national or international meeting;
- support for courses of study at home or overseas.

Preference is given to those presenting at a meeting who have submitted an abstract.

Candidates must be qualified healthcare professionals living and working in the UK, including nurses, dieticians, podiatrists and pharmacists but excluding General Medical Council registered professionals.

Psoriasis Association/PRUK research award ^{NEW}

Pharmacy Research UK (PRUK) and the Psoriasis Association invite applications for their research award. This supports projects relating to pharmacy research into psoriasis. Projects can investigate a range of issues, such as how pharmacy services can support the treatment of psoriasis or how patients can better manage their symptoms with the support of pharmacists.

To be considered eligible for submission the project must have a lead who is based at a UK HEI. The activities must be conducted in the UK or with UK partners as part of a multi-centre study.

The grant is worth up to £20,000 for up to one year.

College of Mental Health Pharmacy/Pharmacy Research UK research award ^{NEW}

Pharmacy Research UK and the College of Mental Health Pharmacy invite applications for their research award. This enables pharmacy professionals to undertake practice research for the benefit of patients with mental illness, and to contribute to enhancing the quality of care with psychiatric medicines through improving pharmaceutical services or ensuring safe and effective use of medicines. Projects are specifically sought in the following areas:

- cross-sector communication and interface working;
- medicines safety or optimisation for those with mental illness by community, general practice or general hospital pharmacy teams;
- relapse prevention and keeping well, including maintaining adherence;
- mental health services in community and primary care, or equivalent areas;
- managing public health issues in mental health, such as physical health.

Applications with a focus on substance misuse may be accepted provided the project aims to benefit patients with co-morbid mental illness.

The lead applicant must be a full or associate member of the CMHP. They must be registered with a professional regulatory body for pharmacy in their home nation, such as the General Pharmaceutical Council, and must be based in the UK. Organisations outside of the UK are welcome to collaborate with the UK-based lead, however the project must have relevance for the UK.

Grants are worth up to £20,000 for between 12 and 20 months.

Research training bursaries ^{NEW}

Pharmacy Research UK, supported by the Leverhulme Trust, invites applications for its research training bursaries. These enable pharmacists to develop their skills in conducting research relating to everyday practice. The following levels of funding are available:

- level one bursaries provide funding to undertake research modules and small-scale projects, worth up to £5,000 each;
- level two bursaries provide funding to pursue a non-pharmacy MSc, worth up to £30,000 each.

All registered community and primary care pharmacists registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council. Research courses must take place in the UK.

Funding is worth up to £30,000 for one year full-time or two years part-time.

Galen research development award ^{NEW}

Pharmacy Research UK invites applications for the Galen research development award. This enables UK-based pharmacists to develop pharmacy practice research capacity. Awards may also be used for new areas of research, such as pre-pilot and feasibility studies that would not be considered by other funding bodies.

Applicants must be registered with the General Pharmaceutical Society. The research must take place in the UK. The annual budget is £30,000 for one or more awards.

British Oncology Pharmacy Association/Pharmacy Research UK research award ^{NEW}

Pharmacy Research UK and the British Oncology Pharmacy Association invite applications for their research award. This supports projects in translational and health service related to oncology and haematology pharmacy with a focus on patient benefit, and provides a platform for novice researchers to engage in research.

Pharmacists and pharmacy technicians who are members of the British Oncology Pharmacy Association may apply. Projects must be conducted in the UK.

Grants are worth up to £10,000 each over one year. They may support an independent research project or research component of a higher degree.

Research grants - British Scoliosis Research Foundation, GB

The British Scoliosis Research Foundation invites applications for its research grants. These support research into scoliosis. The following grants are available:

- small exploratory grants, up to £15,000 for one year, for new investigators who have a preliminary concept they would like to develop into a research project;
- new investigation grants, worth up to £40,000 for two years;
- major research grants for applications in any area of spinal deformity research for a maximum of £100,000 per year for up to two years.

Applications are open to appropriately qualified professionals such as scientists, clinicians and allied health professionals. Applicants from outside the UK are eligible if they collaborate with a UK centre.
